

Sexual Assault Allegations Can Cartoonist's Exhibit

Misconduct allegations have forced the **Pittsburgh Cultural Trust** (PCT) to indefinitely postpone a planned exhibition of works by local cartoonist <u>Ed Piskor</u>. The show

was scheduled to run April 6 to August 25 at 707 Penn Gallery.



Ed Piskor is best known for the award-winning series *Hip Hop Family Tree*. He also co-hosts a YouTube series about cartooning. On March 24, fellow artist Molly Dwyer posted to social media that he began targeting her with question text messages when she was 17 years old --- and he was 40.

PCT announced the postponement just two days later.

"The Trust takes the allegations very seriously and decided yesterday to postpone the exhibition indefinitely," the <u>Pittsburgh Tribune-Review's Ryan Deto</u> quotes a spokesperson.

Another woman has since come forward, reports Matt Petras for Pittsburgh City Paper. She alleges that "Piskor asked for oral sex in exchange for his agent's phone number."

No criminal charges have been filed and Piskor has gone silent online and to requests from various media outlets.

Anti Flag Leader Disappears

A once popular and respected local punk band is mired in further controversy a year after dissolving reports Amanda Waltz for *Pittsburgh City Paper*.

That band was **Anti-Flag**, which folded after allegations of sexual assault against frontman Justin Geever surfaced. [See Pittsburgh Applause, August 2023 - ed.] The charges surprised fans because the charges conflicted with Anti-Flag's established image. "The band was proud to declare itself a safe space for people of all walks of life, especially women, and became vocal supporters of survivors of violent crime after the murder of a band member's sister," explained *Rolling* Stone's Cheyenne Roundtree. "That idealism would also become a central tenet to some of Geever's lyrics."

However, that image was shattered after New York-based therapist and social worker Kristina Sarhardi appeared on a podcast with the story of a post-concert incident when Geever (whose stage name was Justin Sane) violently raped her. Sarhardi filed a civil suit against Geever last November. Waltz is now reporting that her suit has expanded to include the entire band.

Sarhardi's legal team has told Waltz that Geever has "liquidated his assets, transferred money out of the country" later adding that Geever has gone overseas "we do not know where he has gone." Read Waltz's full article for more information.

New TV Show

Two alums of the hit medical drama "ER" (1994-2009) --- actor Noah Wylie and uber producer John Wells --- are reuniting for another medical drama. This one is to be set in Pittsburgh and titled "The Pitt".

The series' logline, as posted to IMDB, reads: "The daily lives of healthcare professionals in a Pittsburgh hospital as they juggle personal crises, workplace politics, and the emotional toll of treating critically ill patients, revealing the resilience required in their noble calling."

IMDB also identifies R. Scott Gemmill ("NCIS: Los Angeles") as the showrunner and writer of the pilot. Fifteen episodes have been ordered by Warner Bros. Discovery's Max streaming service.

"Collaborating with the visionary talents of John Wells, R. Scott Gemmill, and Noah Wyle to develop this new series has already been an exhilarating process," head of Max Original Programming Sarah Aubrey said in a press release. "Their passion, creativity and dedication to storytelling elevate every aspect of the project, and together, we're poised to deliver a compelling and authentic portrayal of today's medical world that will captivate audiences and leave a lasting impact."

Unfortunately, it does not appear that "The Pitt" will join "Mayor of Kingston" as a local production.



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Director Quits Warhol

Patrick Moore is stepping down as head of the Andy Warol Museum, the instruction's parent organization, the Carnegie Museum of Pittsburgh (CLP), has announced.



The news comes as The Warhol celebrates its 30th anniversary.

Moore has been with the Warhol for thirteen years, more than half that time as the museum's director. He will continue in that post until the end of May. Moore and his husband are relocating to Spain.

Writing for *The Art Newspaper*, Elena Goukassian credits Mooe having "expanded [the museum's] exhibition programs worldwide (including to Saudi Arabia) and launched the controversial Pop District—a ten-year, \$80m project that will transform several blocks surrounding the museum with public art, a performance venue and a 'creative-economy workforce development' program."

Rachel Baron-Horn, the museum's deputy director, will run the Warhol while CLP conducts an international search for Moore's successor.



Paramount Global Takes Credit Hit

The latest challenge to confront KDKA-TV's corporate parent:

Paramount Global's credit rating has been lowered to junk status by financial analytics firm S&P Global. As "junk" the firm indicates that the media and entertainment giant may have trouble meeting its debt obligations.

Paramount's traditional businesses --- including the CBS television network and individual stations like KDKA --- remain extremely profitable. But the new media ventures, particularly Paramount+, continue to generate massive losses.

<u>Deadline.com's Dade Hayes</u> explains that "Paramount's ratio of free operating cash flow is not

reason for optimism. The ratio is forecast to come in well below 10%, a key threshold."

In an effort to improve the situation, Paramount Global has sold its India assets for \$517 million and launch an ad supported tier to its streaming services n Europe and Canada.

The company remains a takeover target. The Wall Street Journal's Jessica Toonkel reports that private equity firm Apollo Global Management has made an \$11 billion offer for Paramount's film and television studio (but no other part of the company such as CBS). Apollo co-owns Legendary Entertainment (with Chinese company Wanda Group), Yahoo (with Verizon) and Cox Media Group (with

Cox Enterprises), parent of Pittsburgh TV station WPXI-TV.

After the word was out, writes
Alex Weprin for The Hollywood
Reporter, shares in Paramount
Global rose 12%. Meanwhile,
comedian and entrepreneur Byron
Allen continues to lead a consortium to buy the entire company.

The ultimate decision will likely fall on Shari Redstone, whose family holding company controls Paramount Global.



Leaders Call For More Arts Money

Leading state legislators are openly supporting an increase in arts funding.

On March 19, members of the Pennsylvania Legislative Arts & Culture Caucus held a meeting with the advocacy group

Citizens for the Arts in Pennsylvania. Multiple attendees called for additional financial support from Harrisburg as Pennsylvania spends about 80 cents a year on the arts --- ranking 33rd out of the 50 states. Among the attendees were representatives of the

Greater Pittsburgh Arts Council (GPAC) --- CEO Patrick Fisher, Policy Director Morgan Kasprowicz and Communications Associate Ajani Zanaya Powell.

The trio spoke with the legislators from the counites of Allegheny, Jefferson and Montgomery. They also distributed postcards created by Pittsburgh art-

"Pennsylvania's vast arts and culture community are facing multiple challenges of increased operational and programming

costs," explained former GPAC chief Mitch Swain. He added that these challenges include "changes in attendance and uncertain revenue streams." Swain is currently with Citizens for the Arts in Pennsylvania.

Specifics were not part of the caucus' posted announcement, which you can read by clicking here. However, a blog post by GPAC staffers (available here) says that they encouraged a \$5.4 million boost. The organization is also encouraging members of the creative community and general public to add their voice.


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Restaurant To Include Radio Studio

Seven local iHeart Media radio stations will utilize a studio built into country music star Jason Aldean's new Pittsburgh restaurant. The news was reported by the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's* Ciara McEneany and later by Pittsburgh Patch's Eric Heyl.
Born in 1977, Jason Williams



(Aldean is his stage name) has released eleven albums and 40 singles since 2005. He has won multiple country music awards and has been nominated for five Grammy Awards. In addition to his small chain of restaurants, Aldean co-owns a hunting company.

Aldean's restaurant will be the home studio for the afternoon sports show hosted by radio personality and podcaster Dan Kasper. The show is heard on more than twenty iHeart stations and is available on YouTube, Other stations will also have access to the facility.

The restaurant will be located near Acrisure Stadium (the former Heinz Field) and open later this month. It remains unclear if Aldean will attend the opening.

Audacy Gets Award Nom; Aids Food Bank

A local radio station, Audacy's WDSY-FM (a.k.a. Y108), has been nominated for an Academy of Country Music Radio Award.

Established in 1964, the Academy of Country Music to promote new



and establish country music artists. The awards program was introduced four years later and eventually added categories to support country radio stations. A full list of nominees can be found by clicking here. The ceremony is scheduled for May 16.

Meanwhile, the local Audacy stations recently partnered with the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank and Giant Eagle for the company's annual Feed the Need Radiothon. This year's project raised enough money to provide over 276,000 meals through the food bank.

"For the fifth year in a row, the Pittsburgh community has come together with its City of Champions mentality. We are so grateful for Audacy and its vast network of listeners and partners who make this radiothon what it is," said Lisa Scales of the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank in a press release. "Since its inception shortly after the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, Feed the Need has been a testament to the incredible collaboration and support from our community to help our neighbors in need."

The project has provided more than three million meals since it was first held in 2020.





CLP Honors Librarian

A pioneering African American woman is being honored by the **Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh** (CLP).

That woman is Dr. Vivian Ann Davidson Hewitt (1920-2022) the first Black librarian at CLP who

worked at the system's Hill District and Homewood branches. She is being honored with a program that includes a lecture series and artist residency. A new position, Curator of Black Literature and Programs, has also been created.

"Women of color have been trailblazers throughout the modern history of our profession of librarianship," said the CLP's Andrew Medlar in a press release. "In Pittsburgh, Vivian Ann Davidson Hewitt was that trailblazer. She was an exceptional educator, teacher, library pioneer, and citizen for many decades, and it is an honor to celebrate her life with this initiative, which embodies knowledge and education. We are honored that her legacy remains a part of our library's enduring history."

Dr. Carla Hayden will give the program's inaugural lecture. Dr. Hayden was named the Librarian of Congress by President Barack Obama. For more information, read the press release.

Children's Museum May Unionize

Following the lead set by the Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh employees, staff members at the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh (CMP) may soon unionize



WESA-FM's Jillian Forstadt reports that CMP "employees say they want to improve health and safety conditions, increase transparency, and create better experiences for both museum workers and attendees."

Approximately 65 educators and support staff are involved. An arts educator described to Forstadt that communication between management and staff as "faulty at best."

"There are a lot of communications issues," another CMP educator told WPXI-TV's John Blinn, "there are some concerns about compensation, mobility in the workplace, opportunities that are and aren't available to some people."

At press time,, there had been no official statement released by the museum.



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Music Hall Reopens

Renovations of one of the region's most beautiful performance spaces have been completed.

That space is the Carnegie Music



Hall, which is part of the Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh (CLP) and has been closed for eight months. A press release describes the renovation as "the most significant in Carnegie Music Hall's 129-year history."

Greater accessibility was a key goal and includes wider aisles. Every-

thing from doors and wall sconces to the decorative panels have been addressed. Museum conservators provided guidance to keep the results true to the hall's history and architecture.

"We were really able to enhance the beauty of the original design without changing them," CLP's Steven Knapp told <u>Alexis Papalia</u> of the <u>Pittsburgh Tribune-Review</u>, and do all of that without sacrificing any of the acoustical value of the music hall."

Wray began her new job last month.










