

Pros Opine On Strike: Blame Studios & Nets

Media magnate Barry Diller has this advice for his peers: kick the streaming companies to the curb and make a deal with the unions.

Deadline.com's Dade Hayes posted a report on August 31 about Diller's recent podcast interview. "They should certainly get out of the room with their deepest fiercest and almost conclusive enemy, Netflix, and probably with Apple and Amazon," Diller is quoted. "Because Netflix is in one business and they are the rulers of the business they're in. The other two, Apple and Amazon Prime, are in completely different businesses that have no business model relative to production of movies and television."

Diller labeled Netflix "the architects" of the dual strikes. "[The studios and networks] degraded their investment in cable because of the effect of Netflix on cable. They degraded their investment in their broadcasting arms" -- an assessment not all that different from that of *Pittsburgh Applause* editor James A. Richards [See *Pittsburgh Applause*; August 31; Special Strike Report – ed.]

He adds that the mainstream media firms should tell themselves that "we each own a great television network" and "let's take some of our shows and our creativity and build our networks back up."

Diller isn't alone. The Hollywood Reporter's Alex Weprin writes that, in a conference call with Wall Street analysts, Charter Communications' Chris Winfrey "programmers are caught in a self-imposed dilemma" by focusing on

"short-term profit maximization . . . management teams are not incentivized to drive business for the long-term."



OTHER UNIONS DONATE TO FUND



The guild also wants a set medic present when stunts or hazardous work is performed, just like on a film or television set; prohibitions against stunts on self-taped auditions; and vocal stress protections." (GPAC) to prevent an attempt to cut \$650,000 in COVID-related arts funding have succeeded.

As this newsletter reported last month [*Pittsburgh Applause*; August 2023; page 2 - ed.], a proposal was being considered by the Pittsburgh City Council to amend a previous resolution regarding money provided through the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

"Our role in the community requires us to be an advocate for the artists who live and work in our community and it also requires us to be a partner of others in the community," said GPAC's Pat-

rick Fisher in a press release. "As such, we're happy to partner with the city's administration in any

way possible for a winwin scenario to make sure that the funds dedicated to the arts through ARPA are utilized in a

manner that is equitable and impactful."

GPAC has also announced new members to the organization's Black Arts Action Committee (BAAC). The committee strives to support African American artists and arts groups. New to the BAAC are marketing professional Michael Carroll; choreographer Savionne Chambers; youth leader Kahlil Darden; multidisciplinary artist Petra Floyd and visual artist Ashante Josey.

In addition, GPAC has announced partnership with Jazz-space Consulting for its second Pittsburgh's Racial Equity in the Arts report. The report seeks to assess the role of race



Pittsburgh Symphony Partners With Rapper

Local music history will be made this November, as the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra (PSO) has an-

nounced it partnering with an award-winning rapper for a unique concert.



That rapper is
Pittsburgh native Harvey "Frzy" Daniels,
who won a regional Emmy
Award for his hip-hop remake of "Won't You Be My
Neighbor?" It is the beloved
theme song of the popular
children's television series
"Mister Rogers' Neighborhood." Frzy performed at a
2018 Byham Theater fundraising concert for survivors
of the Tree of Life Synagogue shooting. In 2020, he

unofficially broke the world's record for the longest freestyle rap at 31 hours.

The one-night-only concert will be an orchestration of Frzy's new rap album, "Success." This is the first time that a full orchestration of a full rap album has been performed by either Frzy or the PSO. Local composer and writer Christian Kriegeskotte is crafting the musical arrangements. Frzy has described the album as his "love letter" to Pittsburgh.

"It was my childhood dream to be on the Heinz Hall stage with the PSO because classic music represented genius to me," the rapper explains in a press release. "I never learned to read music, so I learned how to speak it . . . the performance promises to transcend the audience to a place where they are the ink, the orchestra is the pen, and the stage is the paper."

The concert is scheduled for November 8 at Heinz Hall. Tickets are available.

Carnegie Music Hall Begins Renovations

Restoration and renovation have begun has begun on the historic music hall at the Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh (CMP).

Part of the original 1895 structure, the ornate hall has hosted thousands of performances and lectures. The focal point is the handsome pipe organ and its 8,600 pipes. Among the legends to appear on the hall's stage are operatic tenor Luciano Pavoratti (1935-2007), jazz vocalist Ella Fitzgerald (1917-1996), new wave pioneer David Byrne and rock icon Patti Smith.

San Francisco architectural firm Gensler is spearheading the project with two local firms providing construction and engineering services. The new space," explains a press release, "will meet Carnegie Museums' cultural and recreation-

al needs and amplify the economic activity the Music Hall stimulates."



Founded in 1965 by architect Art Gensler (1935-2021), Gensler is an international design firm with offices in 49 countries. Among its most notable projects is the 128-story Shanghai Tower in China. The family owned Volpatt Construction (established in 1991) has won awards for its work on other historic structures such as St. Paul's Cathedral. CJL Engineering was founded in 1938 and has extensive experience in mechanical, electrical, plumbing and fire protection systems.

The grand proscenium arch and murals throughout the hall are to be restored. The electrical system will be updated. Seating will be added to better comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). A new HVAC (heating/ventilation/ air conditioning) system will be installed.

Other local companies involved with the project are Patrinos Painting & Contracting Company (founded in 1969) and contractors McKamish Metals (founded in 1975) and Keystone Electrical Systems (founded in 1997).

The music hall is expected to reopen in early 2024.

Station Switch

The struggling CW network has found a new Pittsburgh affiliate.



After Paramount Global sold most of its stake in The CW, local station WPCW-TV (also owned by Paramount) dropped the miniweb. Sinclair Broadcast Group's WPNT-TV is picking it up as of September 1.

It is part of a multiyear deal involving 35 Sinclair stations and The CW Network, LLC, which is primarily owned by Nexstar Media Group.

Row House To Run Denis

An agreement has been reached between **Row House Cinema** and the **Denis Theatre Foundation** to revitalize a historic suburban movie house.

The Denis Theatre in Mt. Lebanon was built in 1938 by the Harris Amusement Company. The firm was established by Pittsburgh entrepreneur John P. Harris (1871-1926), is credited with creating the earliest cinema showrooms called nickelodeons. The theatre was named after Harris' brother, Denis. It has had several owners over the decades until being acquired by the foundation in 2010. There have been efforts to revitalize the currently empty facility since.

Plans call for Row House to manage the Denis after its renovation. "We are thrilled to be involved with this project and intend to make The Denis a unique and exciting entertainment destination that will strengthen the regional film scene," said Row House owner Brian Mendelssohn said in a press release. "We have learned a lot about operating a community cinema in the last nine years in Lawrenceville and look forward to bringing that knowledge and experience to the South Hills."

The Denis Theatre Foundation will have use of The Denis for special programming. Fundraising is underway to pay for the renovation.

Leap Adds New Service

The parent company of Pittsburgh -based Showclix, Leap Event Technology, has announce the

Welsh Heads Opera Board

Retired accountant and active philanthropist Gene Welsh has been named president of the **Pittsburgh Opera's** board of directors.

This is the second time he has held the position at the Pittsburgh Opera. According to a brief online search, Mr. Welsh also serves on the board of the non-profit **Persad Center** and of the neurophysiological technology company **Computational Diagnostics**.

Joining the board are youth program leader Hilda Fu, attorney

Paul J. Gitnik and attorney Dominic Rupprecht.

Separately, the Opera has announced seven vocalists to this season's resident artist program. A press release explains: "After completing advanced education such as graduate degrees, Pittsburgh Opera's Resident Artists further their careers under the guidance of the opera world's leaders and innovators, including master classes with opera legends. They study languages, diction, movement, and acting, while developing their vocal skills, expanding their repertoire, and performing on stage in Pittsburgh Opera productions."

QED Upgrades Tech

Taiwanese technology company Infortrend has announced an agreement to provide data storage services to WQED Multimedia.

Infortrend explains in a press release that the public broadcaster's growing content necessitated an upgrade. "The existing storage could not satisfy the needs of the [station] neither with throughput nor with capacity requirements causing video playback stuttering, inability to expedite, edit, encode videos on time, which considerably slowed down their projects. Moreover, the outdated storage required excessive maintenance, which was timeand cost-consuming for [the information technology] support department."

Among other benefits, the new service connects fourteen media editing stations and provides a petabyte of storge.



Pens Owner Buys Cable TV Net

What was local unit of AT&T SportsNet is being acquired by the owners of the Pittsburgh Penguins.

The cable channel began in 1986 as Pirates Cable Network and has gone through multiple owners and names since. It is part of a collection of regional sports networks that are being divested by the heavily indebted Warner Bros. Discovery. The buyers, Fenway Sports Group, is rebranding it as SportsNet Pittsburgh. In addition to the Penguins, Fenway's assets include the Boston Red Sox and Lverpool F.C.

John Ourland reports for *Sports Business Journal* that the Pirates are still "considering cutting a deal with Fenway Sports Group to remain on a Pittsburgh-based RSN with the Penguins. Sources say the team is more likely to send its rights to [Major League Baseball], but that decision still hasn't been made." Read his full article here.



Mac Miller Shoes

The skateboard-themed retail chain Van's (a division of **VF Corporation**) is releasing a new line of sneakers in honor of late Pittsburgh rapper Mac Miller.

Malcom "Mac Miller" McCormick (1992-2018) was a self-taught musician who began rapping at the age of 14. He died of an accidental overdose after relocating to Los Angeles. His final album, "Swimming," was released about a month earlier.

Vans has long been connected to music, particularly through sponsorship of the Warped Tour from 1995 to 2019. The shoes are being produced by **Authentic Brands Groups**, whose subsidiaries include Nine West, Brooks Brothers and Reebok.

A portion of the proceeds from the shoes' sales will benefit Miller's nonprofit which supports young musicians. More is available in a Patch Pittsburgh article.

"Confluence" was a well-regarded daily program that took an in depth look at local issues and events. It was pulled from the public station's schedule as part of cost-cutting efforts.



ED OCHESTER (1940-2023)


















